Take a look at the world around you. Watch the news. Listen to what is being said or not said. What words come to mind when you think of cancel culture? Close the churches, but keep the abortion clinics opened? Isolate yourself? Keep your distance from other people? We have to accept those who choose to live immoral lifestyles, but they will not tolerate those who want to stand on God's Word? Churches have closed and many of those that have reopened are preaching a social, non-confrontational, non-judgmental gospel abandoning truth and propagating Satan's deceptive lies. God says, "I will bring their conduct upon their heads" (Ezekiel 9:10).

What will our conduct bring? What does our future hold?

DAY 1

Ezekiel 6:10 says "Then they will know that I am the Lord; I have not said in vain that I would inflict this disaster on them." God has told His people that He will judge them according to their ways and bring their abominations upon them. There will be no pity, just judgment so they will know that He is God and He keeps His word.

6. One more piece of information for you to ponder as you wrap this up for the day. God has clearly stated what He considers abominations in His Word. Since God never changes, then what was an abomination 3,500 years ago is still an abomination today. How does this affect your life and the way you view the events of the world today? How will it affect our lives to live in a society that calls abominations good and good evil?

Today you are going to be looking at a powerful chapter, Ezekiel 9. It speaks to our world today and how God expects us to react to the abominations in our midst.

If so, explain the evidence you see. Is there anything we can do? Carefully evaluate these questions in light of all that we have learned so far in Ezekiel. Be thorough.

- 6. Spend some time in prayer as you meditate on all you learned today.




