They made Challah bread, cheese blintzes, homemade filled donuts, and cookies that they could use as prizes in the dreidel game for Chanukah. It was a fun evening for everyone.

We continue on in our study of Hebrews; although, we did take off for a couple of weeks during the holidays. We plan to begin again in January. We also plan on starting another class on Marriage Tuesday evenings in January. Both of these classes will run through May.

Our Sunday study was interesting on Christmas morning. We talked about whether we could separate fact from fiction in the Christmas story we now hear and see portrayed. It is interesting to take note as to what is in the Bible and what people have added to the story over the years.

UPDATES AND TIDBITS

We are on a two week break right now. You might read that and wonder what exactly a break means. Let me tell you what those two weeks have in

store for us. Getting this letter out was on the top of the list. We have done some online shopping which has been building up, mostly reading books to add to our library and other little odds and ends that have been on our lists. I need to finish up progress reports and then prepare for the last half of the year. Cleaning house, gardening, going to the dentist, spending time with Jimmy and Angel, and trying to reclaim our lives will take up the rest of our time. Jim has been taking every opportunity to go outside and work in our 40-50 degree sunny days and fence in about 40 acres of ground for the goats to graze and dogs to run down the coyotes. About half is already done and just needs to be secured, some God did for us with steep cliffs, and the rest Jim has to pound posts and stretch fence.

The dogs have done a good job of keeping the coyotes and dogs at bay, but the critters are beginning to realize that the dogs can't get out of the goat yard.



We hope to fix that in a couple of months. We continue to praise the Lord for bringing these two beauties into our lives. Zem and Girl continue to

earn their keep by keeping and eye on our goats. A couple of weeks ago we lost our oldest goat, Raven. She was a little over seven years. She gave us ten kids, much milk, and taught us all about taking care of goats. She was a wonderful teacher for us. Looking back over the last year or so, we don't feel that she fully recovered from the bear attack. The last couple of days, when she just wasn't herself, Zem never left her side. The night she died we heard Zem barking



about two in the morning. We believe he was watching over her and not letting any of the other goats or Girl near her. When I went out at 5 AM, Raven was dead and Zem was by her side. I had to drag him away from her. We will miss her. She was a very sweet, loving goat. For the next couple of months, our gardening all but stops. We have some things growing, but they are growing very slowly. Very little watering needs to be done, although there is quite a bit of weeding. All the harvested things have been dried or cooked and put away for the winter. Again, we are thankful for the bounty with which the Lord has blessed us. We have been enjoying some great soups from our garden on our cold winter nights.

We have done quite a bit of traveling this year and I have one more trip planned for March, Lord willing. I flew to PA for my father's funeral in June. Then I flew to PA in November to participate in Dick Feldkamp's memorial service. Jim stayed home to hold down the fort and take care of critters for both of those trips.

In December we both flew to Wisconsin. Jim gave the message at Dick's funeral and at his internment. I spoke and sang - the first time I have sung in front of people for about ten years. Ten years ago I hardly had enough voice to teach, let alone sing. Dick and Janice were a big part of fixing that. They led us to the woman who has been able to help us with our health issues and told us that they would take care of that first visit. When I said to Dick, "How can we ever thank you?" his comment was when you get your voice back, I want you to sing "In Christ Alone" for me. Over the summer my singing voice has started to come back. I was planning to sing him his song when he came back this fall. I never go that chance, but I praise the Lord for the opportunity I had to sing it at his service.

In March, I plan on traveling to Florida to visit my sister, Bonnie. Because of her own health issues, she was not able to attend my father's funeral in June. I know she is still struggling with health issues, and I feel that it is important to go and spend some time with her just as her sister, but also to see if I can help her in any other way as well.

Many people have asked what we did on Christmas with our family. The answer to that is nothing. We have not heard from Jeremy for quite a while. Jimmy worked on Christmas day, and Angel took the girls out to Albuquerque and spent Christmas with her family. Now all the grandkids are away for the break. We will probably plan to have our family get together the weekend they all come back. We are hoping to spend some time with Jimmy and Angel over this break. We always enjoy our time with them.

Did you ever wonder where visions and ideas come from? I believe that God created each of us with a vision of what He wants us to accomplish during our short time on this earth.
