You are about to study one of the most fascinating books in the Bible. If you are interested in prophecy, you need to begin in the book of Daniel. It is a map for all other prophecy. If you want to study a book that will give you courage to stand up to the most difficult storms of life, you need to study Daniel. If you want to know what it means to live with integrity, you need to look at Daniel's life as well as some of his friends. If you want to be overwhelmed with the sovereignty of God, you need to hear what Daniel is going to tell you about the God who raises up kings and brings down kings.

Daniel's message is appropriate for today because its timeless messages span across the ages and reach into your life today as if Daniel was standing right beside you to give you instruction and courage in your daily walk.

Come with us and be awed by the God of history who rules and reigns from His throne. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever, and one day His Rock, Jesus Christ, will come back to this earth to rule and reign as King of kings and Lord of lords. Until He does, let us be busy about His business furthering His kingdom on earth and living as His light in the midst of this world of darkness.

Day One

This is not an overwhelming book, although at first glance (or should I say at first read) it can be. By the time you have completed this study, you will have some good charts to guide you through the difficult parts and have a good handle on the flow of the book. You are in for a real treat. So sit back, make yourself comfortable, grab a cup of tea, pray for God's guidance in your assignment, and dig in. Your assignment for today is to read the book of Daniel. Yes, I know it is 12 chapters long. Depending on your reading speed, it shouldn't take you more than 30-60 minutes to read the book. Don't stop to try to make sense of it. Don't mark anything. Don't take notes. Just read!

Now I have one question for you. Did you see a change in the book somewhere along the way? If so, where was it and what changed?

That's it for today. I hope you are excited to dig into this study.

Day Two

- 1. We are working on an overview of the book fo Daniel. We are not digging into the meat. That will come later. Right now we are laying ground work. Yesterday, I asked you a question. Did you see a change in the book some where along the way? You should have seen a change between chapter six and seven. The first six chapters are an historical account of Daniel's life in captivity first under the Babylonian Empire and then under the Medo/Persian Empire.
- 2. Today we are going to take a closer look at Daniel, but remember, it is still an overview. I would like you to read chapters one and two today. You are going to read them one at a time, and you have an assignment after you read each one. Read all the steps carefully so you know what to do when you are done reading each chapter.

At the end of this lesson there is a chart that you are going to fill out. Don't look at commentaries to get your answers. Just do YOUR best and don't worry if there is something you can't answer.

You may be happier to use a pencil on this chart, so you can change your answers if as you study, you see something you didn't see before.

- a. <u>Time</u> When did the events of this chapter occur. It may specifically say, "during the _____ year of _____". If it doesn't, you may be able to tell if it was at the beginning, end, or during the reign of a certain king.
- b. Kingdom Record what kingdom is ruling during this chapter. It will be obvious.
- c. **Daniel's Age** It is not going to specify that Daniel was 27 years old. Was he old, young, what terminology does Daniel use (child, old man, youth), or doesn't it specify.
- d. <u>Main Events</u> What occurred in this chapter? Don't be too detailed. This is an overview.
- e. <u>God's Sovereignty</u> Record what events show God's sovereignty over kings or circumstances.
- f. <u>Characteristics</u> Look for characteristics of Daniel and his friends. What do you see in their lives that showed them to be men of integrity, things that should be emulated in your life?
- g. <u>Titles</u> A title helps you to remember what the chapter was about. Use as few of words as possible, but be specific enough so you will see the chapter in your mind.

Day Three

Today you are going to complete the same assignment as yesterday, this time with chapters three and four.

Day Four

Today's chapters are five and six. This will complete the historical portion of Daniel.

Day Five

Today, I would like you to take the time to read Daniel 1-6. As you do this, I want you to specifically watch the change between chapter five and six. What changes? On your chart, there is a blank between those two chapters. Write what occurs between five and six in that column.

Next week you will begin digging deeper into these wonderful chapters. What blessing lies before you if you are diligent to complete the race that is set before you.

Record anything that has impressed you this week with your study. God is awesome. Take time to praise Him.

This week we are going to dig into the first chapter of Daniel and meet a man who knew what it meant to live with integrity. Daniel knew what it meant to be oppressed by the circumstances of life, yet he made a decision to stand firm for the God of Israel. Listen to his heart, observe his life, and learn what it means to be a man or woman of God.

Last week we saw that there was a division between the first six and last six chapters of Daniel. In the first six chapters, we see the history of Daniel's life unveiled to us. We walk with him through his struggles and his victories. Through the first six chapters we are going to watch 70 years of his life pass by us, and oh, what things we can learn from him! The last six chapters deal with the prophetic part of Daniel's ministry, and we can stand in amazement of how God used this man to lay out the history of mankind.

Be prepared to be blessed and enjoy seeing God's sovereignty on display in all of its glory.

Day One and Day Two

For the next two days, you are going to work on the observation worksheets for Daniel chapter one. These observation worksheets are online that you can print off for yourself, or, if you live close by, we will run them off for you. They are just the book of Daniel typed out so that you have room to mark them, make pertinent notes, etc. They are worksheets!

Because this is a historical book, we will treat it a bit differently than other studies. Instead of looking for key words throughout the book and try to catch the flow through the book, you are going to look at each chapter. Each chapter tells its own story of an event in Daniel's life. This week you will focus on chapter one. So follow the steps below. **Remember that you have two days to complete this assignment!**

- 1. Aways begin your time of study in prayer. Ask the Lord to instruct you and teach you His ways as you study His Word. Remember that the Holy Spirit that indwells the child of God is your teacher, and He will lead you into all truth (I Cor 2:10; John 14:26; 16:13).
- 2. Read through Daniel 1. Don't take time to mark anything; just read straight through. Record any thoughts, questions, or observations you have about this chapter in the space below.

- 3. The next step is to look for key words. Key words are repeated, important words, without which, you would lose the meaning of what Daniel was trying to communicate. I will get you started with a couple of words and let you take if from there. If you are new to this, you may want to read through Daniel 1 looking for and marking the first key word. Then read it again looking for the next key word.
 - a. God (and any pronoun that refers to God) this is always key in any book you read. I mark God in a purple triangle purple for royalty and the triangle for the triune God.
 - b. Daniel (and any pronoun that refers to him) I underlined Daniel in green
 - c. Mark other people (along with pronouns) that are mentioned mark each differently so they are easily distinguishable.
 - d. Wisdom (and its synonyms like knowledge/intelligence) I use a yellow lightbulb
 - e. Time references (always key in historical books) a mention of an event happening during the reign of a certain king, specific number of days, weeks, or years, or the phrase "in the third year of . . .". I mark my time references with a blue clock, and I underline the phrase in blue
 - f. Mark any other words that you may see repeated in this chapter that are important to the flow of the story. Mark them in a distinctive color and in a distinctive way so that you can easily find them at a quick glance.
- 4. Make a list of what you learn about each of the key words. Your list may look something like the one below. Do this for each key word. You will learn much making these lists! Think it through and don't rush this. If you keep these truths in a notebook, you will have a treasure when you are done!

5. List the main events in this chapter. Don't get too detailed right now.

6. Determine a good strong chapter title that will remind you of the events in this chapter. Record this on the line that says "Chapter Theme" under Daniel 1.

Good work! You are off to a great start.

Day Three

In our first class, we went over a timeline of Israel's history. Take some time to review that. It is on the website, but I have enclosed a copy at the end of this lesson as well for your convenience.

Our timeline took us up to the point that Babylon took Judah captive. Let's dig into why this happened.

1. Read Deuteronomy 28:1-9, 15-57, 63-65. As the Israelites are about to enter the Promised Land, God promised them blessings for obedience and warned of the curses that would come upon them for their disobedience. Record what will happen if they <u>disobey</u> God.

2. Read Deuteronomy 30. See God's heart towards His people. Record what you learn.

3. Now read Daniel 1:2. What do you think happened that caused God to give them over to Nebuchadnezzar?

4. It is time for a more in depth look at what happened to the kingdom of Judah. The Northern Kingdom of Israel was taken into captivity by Assyria in 722 B.C. Read II Kings 17:1-23 and record what happened.

5. This should have served as an example to her sister, the Southern Kingdom of Judah, but she did not learn. Instead, she repeated the same sins, and headed into the same judgment. This time God brought in Babylon to lead the people into captivity. It happened in three stages. On the next page you will find a chart that will lead you through what happened in each stage.

Day Four and Day Five

You have set the background of the book, now its time to look at the man. Take your time and prayerfully think through each one of these questions.

1. Read through Daniel 1. As you do, watch Daniel's attitude toward God and his captors. Record what you learn about Daniel.

2. Skim over Leviticus 11. These are the dietary rules for the Jewish people. Does this help you understand why Daniel may have wanted to stick to just eating vegetables? Explain.

3. Where did Daniel get the strength as a teen to stand in that pagan society? Read Deuteronomy 6 and see if it gives you any insights to Daniel's upbringing.

4. How well do you think Daniel knew his God and God's Word?

5. In the cultures of Daniel's time, it is very likely when Daniel was chosen to serve in the king's court, he would have been castrated and made a eunuch. In Daniel 1:3 the expression "the chief of his officials" could be translated "the chief of his eunuchs." If so, does it give you any more insight to Daniel?

6. Read Daniel 1:2. Remember why the people were taken captive. Contrast the people of Judah as a whole with what you have learned about Daniel. Record your insights.

7. How did God respond to Daniel?

8. What would you have done if you were in Daniel's shoes?

11. If you have any time left for this week's study, you can check what your commentaries have to say about Daniel 1.



Daniel Lesson 2, Chapter 1

Nebuchadnezzar had a dream, and what a dream it was. It troubled him to the point of driving his sleep away. He wanted to understand the dream. That dream serves as a basis of all prophecy. Your job this week is three fold. First, to observe the awesomeness of God. Second, to learn to be a Daniel in your world. Lastly, to understand the dream of the statue and its interpretation.

Are you ready to be blessed?

Day One and Day Two

You are going to work on the observation worksheets for Daniel chapter two. Follow the directions that you were given last week on pages 5-7. You have two days to complete this **assignment!** Don't forget to take the time to record your information in your "notebook."

Day Three

Today you are going to take a good look at the statue of Nebuchadnezzar's dream. As you do this, do not go to any other sources. Allow God's Word to be your guide.

1. Start by reading Daniel 2. Take time to think through Daniel's reaction to the situation with which he in confronted. What can you learn from him that you can apply to your own life?

- 2. Reread Daniel 2:31-45. Read slowly and carefully. Record which verses were the
 - a. Dream
 - b. Interpretation of the dream

3. Read just the verses that deal with the interpretation of the dream. Where does Daniel spend the most time? What part of the statue does he seem to focus on?

- 4. On pages 25-26 of this lesson are two pictures of the statue. They are identical. You can use one as a work sheet and the other as your finished product if you wish.
 - a. Divide the statue into the parts mentioned in the dream and the interpretation.
 - b. It would be helpful to color in the statue according to the metal that is mentioned. This will give you a better visual memory of the various parts of the statue.
 - c. Now label each part of the statue and what it stands for.
- 5. Take a look at the picture that you have before you. This represents 2,600+ years of history and it is more detailed than you may think at first glance.
- 6. Take time today to praise God for being the God of history. After all, history is His story, and through Daniel, He is sharing His story with you in vivid detail. We serve an awesome God!

Day Four

Yesterday, you should have realized that the majority of the interpretation of the statue dream focused on the stone and what it did to the statue. Today, you are going to zoom in on that part of the statue. There is still much to learn, so hang in there.

1. Read through Daniel 2:31-45 again. List everything you learn about the stone and what it did, how it did it, etc.

2. Since there is that much detail surrounding the stone, at this point in time, what do you think it means? Why was it "cut out of the mountain without hands"?

3. Daniel 2:35 says that the stone "became a great mountain." What does that mean exactly? Is he talking about a literal mountain, or is he referring to something different? Let's take a look at mountains throughout Scripture and see how that word is used. Let Scripture interpret Scripture. Record the significance of these mountains and afterward you can determine if you have reaped any beneficial information to answer question #2.

4. Record the different ways the word mountain can be used throughout Scripture.

5. Next, let's take a look at the stone that becomes a great mountain. Understanding that, may help you understand how the word "mountain" is being used in this passage. Record what you learn in Daniel 2:34-35, 45 about the stone and its relationship to the mountain.

6. Read Genesis 49:22-26. Jacob (Israel) is blessing sons before he dies. These verses record the blessing given to Jospeh. Carefully read verse 24 and record what you learn about the "Stone of Israel."

- 7. Look up the following references that talk about the "stone." Record what you learn from each passage.
 - a. Psalm 118:22
 - b. Isaiah 28:16
 - c. I Peter 2:4-8

8. Considering everything you have studied to this point, let's see how you would now answer the question posed in #2. "Since there is that much detail surrounding the stone, at this point in time, what do you think it means? Why was it "cut out of the mountain without hands?" Be sure to use Scripture to support your thoughts.

9. Take the time to go back to your statue picture and label it with a little more detail. Make sure that it is color and make sure that it is done in ink, so it will be a permanent reminder of Daniel 2. You can use the other picture if you would like.

Day Five

Today you are going to take the time to pull all of this together and apply what you have learned to your life. Without the constant application of God's Word to our lives, our study time is wasted. Head knowledge puffs up. Knowledge applied to our lives helps us to walk in a manner worthy of our Lord, helping us to please Him in all respects.

- 1. Read Daniel 2 one more time. Concentrate on what led up to Daniel being called to tell Nebuchadnezzar of the dream and its interpretation.
- 2. Why do you think God gave Nebuchadnezzar that dream? Why do you think God gave Daniel the interpretation? If you have specific verses to back up your thoughts, record those as well.


3. Why would Nebuchadnezzar not tell the magicians, the conjurers, the sources, and the Chaldeans his dream? Read through Daniel 2:1-12. Look at the relationship the king had with these men. Record all that you learn with verses.

4. How did Daniel and his friends differ from the other group? How did they respond? Be specific!


- 5. What did Nebuchadnezzar learn about God because of Daniel's response? Look at the end of the chapter to answer that question.
- 6. When we started this chapter, Daniel was under threat of death. What happened after Daniel interpreted the dream?

7. What have you learned from this chapter that you can apply to your life. Be specific and take each one of your applications to the Lord in prayer. Seek Him as you strive to become a Daniel to your family, church, workplace, and community. Daniels affect everything and everyone around them!

Daniel Lesson 3, Chapter 2



When everyone around you bows to the external pressures of life, what will you do? Will you bow with them, or will you stand firm on your convictions? It's a lonely place to stand, and the fiery trials before us can be overwhelming.

Learn what these youths knew that will allow you to take a mighty stand for God regardless of the pressures that surround you.

Day One and Day Two

- 1. Complete your observations on Daniel 3, and don't forget your lists!
- 2. When you are done, there are a couple of questions that you need to carefully think through and answer.
 - a. What convictions do you have that you would refuse to bow on?

b. Do you have any convictions that you would be willing to die for?

c. There was a story that a missionary once told. It occurred in a closed country where meeting together to worship God was punishable by death. There was a group of people meeting in secret when a masked man carrying an automatic weapon burst into the building and told anyone who didn't want to worship God to leave, the rest were to line up against the wall. Many scampered away, and those who remained lined up, ready to die for the God they loved and served. When the room contained only those who were willing to die for their Lord, the gunman removed his mask and asked those who remained, how he could know their God. Where would you have been - lined up against the wall or one who left the building?

Day Three

- 1. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-nego refused to bow while everyone else did. Where did they get the backbone to stand against the tide? Think about what we learned about Daniel in chapter one.
- 2. Read Daniel 3:16-18. Why do you think these men didn't have to stop and consider whether they were going to bow before the image?

- 3. The Ten Commandments are listed in Exodus 20. Read Exodus 20:1-6. As you read through these verses answer the following questions.
 - a. According to these verses, what would Shadrach, Meshach, and Aged-nego have violated if they bowed to the image?
 - b. What were the consequences for violating these commands?
 - c. Some people feel that it is not fair that iniquity would be visited on future generations. Knowing that God is a just God, how would you explain this?

4. Deuteronomy brings Israel to the boundary of the promised land. As they are about to enter into this idolatrous land, God reminds them of the laws that they are to obey. Read Deuteronomy 4:1-31. List what you learn about idols, man's temptation to worship them, God's judgment on those who worship, attributes of God, etc. Take what you have recorded and compile them into lists of what you learn.

Day Four

- 1. When we studied the history of Israel, you should remember that when Judah was given over into the hands of Babylon, that they were taken in three sieges. Daniel and his friends were taken in the first siege and Ezekiel was taken in the second. Read Ezekiel 6:9 and record how idolatry affects God and the idolator.
- 2. Now read Ezekiel 23. As you read through what happens to these two sisters, remember that they are referring to Israel and Judah. Record what you learn about each.

Day Five

Today we are going to turn our attention to the New Testament. What does it have to say about idolatry?

- 1. Look up the following verses and record what you learn about idolatry.
 - a. Galatians 5:19-21
 - b. Colossians 3:5-11
- 2. Read I Corinthians 10 and I Corinthians 8:4-6. Form a list of what you learn about idolatry.

3. From what you have learned, how would you define idolatry?

4. Is this something that is a problem in our society today? Explain your answer.

5. If you know that an idol is not really God, then why would it hurt to bow down to it if it meant the difference between life or death?

6. Read Revelation 13. Is there anything in here that would be considered idolatry? Explain.

7. Now look at Revelation 20:4. What happens to someone who has worshipped the image of the beast? The beast is from Satan, but any form of an idol or idol worship is also from Satan. It is his way of taking your mind off Christ and focusing it on the things of this world. Think about that while you answer this question.

8. Can you see any parallels between Revelation 13:11-18 and Daniel 3?

9. What would you do if you couldn't buy or sell unless you were willing to worship the beast?

Daniel Lesson 4, Chapter 3 "Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before stumbling" - Proverbs 16:18. Nebuchadnezzar was about to understand the meaning of that saying. The higher that pride elevates a person, the further they have to fall.

Daniel warned the king. He called him to humble himself before an almighty God. He did not heed, and it cost him dearly. What about you? What have you done with the pride in your life?

James 4:6-10 says this. "But He gives a greater grace. Therefore it says, "God is opposed to the proud, but gives grace to the humble." Submit therefore to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded. Be miserable and mourn and weep; let your laughter be turned into mourning and your joy to gloom. Humble yourselves in the presence of the Lord, and He will exalt you."

Day One and Day Two

- 1. Complete your observations on Daniel 4. Don't forget lists, lists, lists!
- 2. When you are done, I have an assignment for you. Some of you are not artistic and neither am I, but I would like you to try to draw out Nebuchadnezzar's dream. My suggestion would be to draw it in two parts. The first part of the dream is what he saw, the second is what happened to the tree and yes, include the picture of the beast. I gave you room on this page and the next.

Day Three

- 1. Who is giving the account of the events that took place in Daniel 4? How do you know?
- 2. Today, you are going to look at who Nebuchadnezzar was and how he felt about and acted toward God. Start in chapter one and record what you learn about this man in each chapter. What were his characteristics? How did he treat other people? How did he feel about God? Did his attitude toward God change, and if so, why? Pay particular attention to Nebuchadnezzar's initial response to Daniel's interpretation of the dream in chapter 4.

Day Four

1. Here are a couple of questions to ponder. Who is in charge of this universe? Is power divided between God, Satan, and man? If you needed to answer these questions from just the first four chapters of Daniel, how would you answer them? Be thorough and use Scripture.

2. Could Nebuchadnezzar have averted his dilemma in chapter 4? If so, how? Support your answer with Scripture.

3. Did Nebuchadnezzar understand what happened to him and why? What was his response? Again, support your answer with Scripture.

- 4. "El Elyon" is a name for God that means the God "Most High." There is none above Him, greater than Him. This particular name for God is used in 48 verses throughout the Bible, most occurring in Psalms and Daniel. He is the "Most High" over what. Check out a few more verses just to grasp this concept in your own mind. Over what does God have supreme authority, dominion, absolute power? Read these verses and then come back and answer that question.
 - a. Psalm 59:13
 - b. Psalm 66:7
 - c. Psalm 103:19

What exactly does God rule over?

- 2. Let's end this lesson by praying back Scripture to God. If you have never done this before, let me show you how to do this. All of these verses tell of God's sovereignty. Read the verse, record what you learn about God, and turn that into a prayer of acknowledgement and praise. I'll do the first one with you. This is a great way to pray when you are not sure what to pray.
 - a. Deuteronomy 32:39

'See now that I, I am He, And there is no god besides Me; It is I who put to death and give life. I have wounded and it is I who heal, And there is no one who can deliver from My hand.

Father, I praise You and only You because there is no god besides You. You have the power over life and death, over wounding and healing. There is no one who can stop you or keep you from doing exactly as you have planned. You are the great and mighty God.

This timeline covers the time period from David through the Roman Emperor Domitian.)

Day Three

1. Read through Daniel 5 and see if you can discern Daniel's position in Babylon at this time. Specify the verse in which you found this information.

2. When this problem arose and Daniel was called, notice how he dealt with Belshazzar. Can you see a difference between Daniel's relationship with Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar?

3. Here is a very important question. How was Belshazzar like his father? Did he have to be that way? Did he have a choice or was he just a product of circumstance? Use Scripture to support your answer.

4. You probably added this to your lists from Day One and Two, but it is worth answering again. What do you learn about God's sovereignty as you read this chapter?

5. One last assignment for the day. Read Daniel 2-5. As you do, watch Nebuchadnezzar's life as well as Belshezzar's. Record how pride was exhibited in their lives. Tomorrow we are going to delve into what Scripture tells us about pride.

 - b. Read Daniel 6:28. What does this show you?
 - c. From which country did Cyrus and Darius come?
 - d. Look at the timeline at the end of this lesson. What do you notice about the reigns of Cyrus and Darius?
 - e. Just to put you into context, Daniel had been in captivity for 66 years by the time the Medes and Persians took over Babylon.

- 2. Daniel 5 brings about the fall of the Babylonian Kingdom. Let's take a look at that in more detail. You have already seen that the new kingdom was a two-sided kingdom or two kingdoms united together with a common purpose destroy Babylon. This was a kingdom made up of the Medes and the Persians. The Medes were the first to rise to power, but they were soon overshadowed by a stronger Persia led by a powerful ruler named Cyrus.
 - a. Cyrus isn't mentioned until the end of Daniel 6, but since he was such an influential man, it is important to see what God's Word has to say about him. Isaiah prophesied primarily to the Southern Kingdom of Judah. 175 years before Babylon fell, Isaiah received a prophecy about Cyrus, long before Cyrus had even been born. Read Isaiah 45:1-13 carefully and record everything you learn about Cyrus, Jerusalem, Israel, and God. Record your insights in the spaces provided.



c. There is a very interesting passage in II Chronicles 36. It is so exciting to watch one Scripture layered on top of another, and we watch God bring about His plans in magnificent detail. Read this chapter but pay special attention to verses 22 and 23. This the fulfillment of a 175-year-old prophecy. Isn't God great? d. Read Ezra 1:1-11. What connection does this have with Belshazzar's actions at the beginning of Daniel 5?

e. Now read Ezra 3:1-13. Record what happened after the remnant returned to Jerusalem. Be detailed and include verse numbers. Compare what you learn with the timeline at the end of this lesson.



Daniel Lesson 6, Chapter 5 Surrounded by lions, what can you do? Your choice is two-fold. You can focus on the lions or on the One who created the lions. In your times of trouble, which will you choose - the problems of the world or the One who created the world?

Day One and Day Two

For the next two days, you will complete your observation worksheets on Daniel 6. This is the last of the historical chapters. Before you begin your observations, read numbers one through four below. This will help you prepare your heart for this week's study.

- 1. Chapters 1-6 have covered almost 70 years of history.
- 2. Look at your timeline from last week and compare where Darius the Mede's reign begins and the Babylonian captivity of Judah ends. What do you learn about these two events?
- 3. Daniel 6 is one of the most familiar Bible stories, so it is very difficult to approach this chapter with fresh eyes. As you read and study over the next two days, allow the words to speak afresh to your heart. There is so much to learn from this chapter, so much that Daniel's life can teach us. Listen and learn.
- 4. Begin each day in prayer and ask that the Holy Spirit will teach you truth that you can apply to your life. Ask that He opens your eyes of understanding.

Day Three

1. Read though Daniel 6 again, slowly and carefully. Record what you learn about Daniel from this chapter.

2. Daniel continued to kneel in prayer three times a day. No law, no threat was going to hinder his relationship with God. Where have we seen this commitment before? When do you think this resolve started in his life?

3. Daniel gave thanks to the Lord even though he knew it might cost him his life. What about you? Search your heart. How strong is your commitment to your Lord and Master?

4. If you were to describe Daniel, what words would you use?

- 5. You are going to look up some verses. As you read them, record how they could apply to Daniel. You may find a key, repeated word to add to your list in #4.
 - a. Psalm 7:8
 - b. Psalm 26:1
 - c. Proverbs 11:2-9 (focus on verse 3)
 - d. Proverbs 19:1

Day Four

1. Yesterday we looked at Scriptures that talked about integrity. Daniel was a man of integrity. Define "integrity." You can use your Bible study tools, a dictionary, or anything else that is available to you.

2. Integrity isn't what people think you are, it is what your family knows you are. People tend to put their best foot forward when they are at church, in the work place, or around other people. But when they are with their family, their guard is down and all the ugly that has been building up inside, comes out. Not true with the person of integrity. There is an inner peace that allows them to handle any problem, trial, or temptation with grace and dignity, honoring God with their words and actions. Let's look at Job 1 and 2. Briefly record the major events that occur in Job's life.

3. The book of Job is 42 chapters in length. Throughout most of those chapters, Job's "friends" pointed their fingers at Job and blamed him for all his suffering. From chapters 4-37 they accused him of being evil, criticized his every action, and judged every nuance of his life. Job tried to defend himself, but you know that when someone has already predetermined your guilt, there is little hope of them listening to your side of the story. In Job's case, God spoke to Job (and his friends) out of a whirlwind. When God speaks, you better listen! In chapters 38-41, God declared His glory and majesty. He alone is Creator, Sustainer, Sovereign King, and Judge of the thoughts and intentions of the minds of men. How dare these "friends" presume to put themselves in His place. God was going through a process in Job's life. Job may not have understood what was happening, but he was going to trust God and hold fast his integrity. Read the following verses and record what you learn about Job's attitude through all this.

a. Job 2:3

b. Job 27:1-6 (focus on verse 5)

c. Job 31 (focus on verse 6, but you need to know its context, so record his claims of integrity)

4. Read Matthew 5:27-28 and describe where integrity starts. How deep does it go?

- 5. Before we get personal, let's look at the someone who lost their integrity and how God deals with them. Read I Kings 9:1-9. Keep in mind that our study is focused on integrity or the lack thereof.
 - a. To whom is God speaking?
 - b. What was the promise God made if he walked in integrity?
 - c. What will happen if he doesn't walk in integrity?
 - d. From what we have been studying, what was Solomon's decision?

e. Why did this happen? What came into his life that caused him to loose his integrity? Read I Kings 11:1-14 and note what happened and why.

6. Let's apply this to the church and the world around us. In light of what you have learned, should a sexually immoral man hold office? Start with answering this question within the church and then broaden your answer to a public office.

7. What about your life? How do you measure up on the integrity scale?

Day Five

1. Take a couple of moments to reflect back on the last couple of days and weeks of study. Summarize what you have learned about walking in integrity.

2. Go back through Daniel chapter by chapter. Record situations that occurred and how Daniel stood fast in his integrity. In chapter 3, record the same information even though it is attributed to Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-nego. (Integrity is the same in their lives as well as Daniel's.)

8. One last assignment, before we call it a week. If you have commentaries, you can read what they have to say about Daniel 6. Do not go any further than that! Depending on what you read, it may shed some light on the Medo/Persian Empire.

If you want to study and understand prophecy, you need to begin in the book of Daniel. It is a map for all other prophecy. Remember the dream of the statue and the stone? Chapters 7-12 will fill in all the details of that dream in remarkable detail. You will begin to understand the end times and will build for yourself a solid foundation that will allow you to step forth into a study of prophecy with greater confidence. Daniel is the key to understanding God and His future plans. It will help you to anticipate the coming of the King of kings and the Lord of lords. May you come to grips with the truly awesome, sovereign God of this universe.

Day One

- 1. Always begin your study with prayer. Ask God to open your mind of understanding. Have a teachable spirit and allow God to reveal Himself to you and to help you to learn how to live as you watch the integrity of the life of this man named Daniel.
- 2. We are going to spend quite a bit of time on Daniel 7. This is a key chapter which fills in many details to the prophetic map that we are going to sketch out. Work carefully, and allow God to teach you and lead you into truth. Don't run to commentaries to get answers. The joy is being able to mine them for yourself.
 - a. Do your observations on Daniel 7. Read it carefully and continue to mark all the following words in a distinct color and symbol so they will stand out easily. Even if you can mark everything on the first time through, make sure that you take time to read through the chapter several times.

That's it for today. I pray that this study will be a real blessing to your life. Don't get frustrated! It is worth the time and effort that you put into it, I promise!

^{7.} If you don't have a chapter theme or title, decide on one now. Record it at the beginning of chapter 7 as well as the "At a Glance Chart" at the end of this lesson. Take the time to transfer your chapter titles from chapters 1-6 as well.

Day Three and Four

- 1. Take the time to read through Daniel chapter 7 again. Make sure you have recorded what you learn about Daniel and God on your lists that you started at the beginning of this study. Take a moment to review your list. What a blessing that should be. Spend some time in prayer thanking God for His awesomeness. Ask Him to help you become a Daniel!
- 2. As you read through this chapter, picture what is going on. Write down each of the major events. Give a brief description of each event. That will help you with the next step.

3. Now we are going to have some fun. Don't become intimidated by this project. You don't have to be a great artist. You are going to draw a picture of each major event that takes place in this chapter. Use stick figures if necessary. Use as many picture boxes as you need to complete the story. This will be somewhat like a comic strip when you are done, where each frame tells you about an event in the story. Use as many or as few of pictures as you need. Please try this assignment. If you do, you will not forget this chapter when you are done. Isn't that what studying is all about, committing this to your memory, your mind, your heart? Have fun! Use words as necessary to narrate the action or to label parts of your picture. You may want to use your own paper for this project. If not, I have left you the next two pages as your drawing board.  - b. Now look at Revelation 17:3, 12 and see what the horns represent.



Daniel Lesson 8, Chapter 7 Four beasts. A lion with wings. A bear raised up on one side with three ribs in its mouth. A four-headed leopard with four wings. A terrible beast with ten horns. What are these beasts? Who or what do they represent? What is their importance? This week we will look at these beasts in light of the book of Revelation. This will be the topic of study over the next two weeks.

Day One

- 1. We are going to continue our study on Daniel 7. This time we are going to focus on that fourth beast. Read through chapter 7 paying special attention to the fourth beast. Record all that you observe about that fourth beast on the chart entitled "The Beasts and the Dragon of Daniel and Revelation" on pages 83 and 84 of this lesson. Take your time as you work through this assignment. Make sure that you record this in the column labeled Daniel 7.
- 2. Read Daniel 7 one more time. As you do, see if there is anything else that you may see or question. The more familiar you become with this chapter, the more God can open your eyes to discover truth. It will be worth the effort, so hang in there!

Day Two

In Daniel, the little horn "will intend to make alterations in times and in law; and they (the saints) will be given into his hand for a time, times, and half a time." The word translated "time" in Daniel 7:25 is the Aramaic word 'iddan". It can refer to a general or a specific period of time such as time, period, span, year, era, etc. There are several ways that it can be translated like "time" in Daniel 2:8 and "moment" in Daniel 3:15. The context of the passage will help you determine the proper usage of the word.

When we look in Revelation, the Greek word kairos is the word we translate *"time"*. This can also be a general or specific time; however, when we look at several Scriptures in Revelation we can let the context determine the meaning. Let me tell you a little bit about how the Hebrews calculated time. They, too, had 12 months in their year. Each month had 30 days which means that they had 360 days in their year. Look at each of these Scriptures. Record the time period listed as well as what occurs during that time. Look at those time periods in terms of days, months, and years.

Read through chapter 12. Look for and mark time references along with any key words you observe
- 2. Record what you learned on the "The Beasts and the Dragon of Daniel and Revelation" in the column for Revelation 12 on pages 83 and 84.
- 3. List the similarities you see between Daniel 7 and Revelation 12 in the space below.

Day Four

1. Begin today by reading through Revelation 12 again. Either write the events that occur or draw out the events in pictures like you did with Daniel 7. You may need to use other paper.

2. Now read through Revelation 13 carefully and mark the key words. You can find an observation worksheet at the end of this lesson on pages 87 and 88.

- 3 I saw one of his heads as if it had been slain, and his fatal wound was healed And the whole earth was amazed and followed after the beast;
- 4 they worshiped the dragon because he gave his authority to the beast; and they worshiped the beast, saying, "Who is like the beast, and who is able to wage war with him?"
- 5 There was given to him a mouth speaking arrogant words and blasphemies, and authority to act for forty-two months was given to him.
- 6 And he opened his mouth in blasphemies against God, to blaspheme His name and His tabernacle, that is, those who dwell in heaven.
- 7 It was also given to him to make war with the saints and to overcome them, and authority over every tribe and people and tongue and nation was given to him.
- 8 All who dwell on the earth will worship him, everyone whose name has not been written from the foundation of the world in the book of life of the Lamb who has been slain.
- 9 If anyone has an ear, let him hear.

- 10 If anyone is destined for captivity, to captivity he goes; if anyone kills with the sword, with the sword he must be killed Here is the perseverance and the faith of the saints.
- 11 Then I saw another beast coming up out of the earth; and he had two horns like a lamb and he spoke as a dragon.
- 12 He exercises all the authority of the first beast in his presence And he makes the earth and those who dwell in it to worship the first beast, whose fatal wound was healed.
- 13 He performs great signs, so that he even makes fire come down out of heaven to the earth in the presence of men.
- 14 And he deceives those who dwell on the earth because of the signs which it was given him to perform in the presence of the beast, telling those who dwell on the earth to make an image to the beast who had the wound of the sword and has come to life.
- 15 And it was given to him to give breath to the image of the beast, so that the image of the beast would even speak and cause as many as do not worship the image of the beast to be killed.
- 16 And he causes all, the small and the great, and the rich and the poor, and the free men and the slaves, to be given a mark on their right hand or on their forehead,
- 17 and he provides that no one will be able to buy or to sell, except the one who has the mark, either the name of the beast or the number of his name.
- 18 Here is wisdom Let him who has understanding calculate the number of the beast, for the number is that of a man; and his number is six hundred and sixty-six.

This week may seem redundant, but it is very important that we have a grip on what these chapters are saying before we move on in Daniel. Allow God to take all that you have learned and drive it into your mind that you may begin to grasp the sovereignty of God and realize that He has already written the future. No matter what we see in the world around us, we can rest assured that He is on His throne and His kingdom will rule forever. If we belong to Him, we know that we know, we are on the winning side. May God bless you this week as you look at these passages with fresh eyes.

Day One Through Four

- Starting on the next page there are several charts that you are going to use to compare five different passages concerning these kingdoms both past and future. I hope this will be a blessing as you compare these Scriptures and see how they relate to each other and the details they bring to light. The chart is laid out using the Daniel 2 passage as a starting point. I started you out by filling in some brief details. Fill in as many details as you can from Daniel 2 in each of the seven areas. Include the verse numbers next to each detail so you have an easy point of reference.
- 2. Being just as detailed, read through and record all the information from Daniel 7 where they would occur in the Daniel 2 passage. For example, if Daniel 7 talks about judgment coming to the nations, you would put that next to Daniel 2 where the stone crushed the feet of the statue. Make sure you continue to add your verse numbers for easy reference.
- 3. You are going to do the same thing for Revelation 12 and 13. These are found in last week's lesson on pages 85-88. Here's a little hint the Revelation passages will not start to fill in details until the section dealing with the feet partly of iron, partly of clay.

Day Five

Today we are going to add Revelation chapter 17 to our list. There is an observation worksheet for this chapter at the end of this lesson on page 97-98. Carefully read it, mark key words, and then record any pertinent information on the chart.

- 1 Then one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls came and spoke with me, saying, "Come here, I will show you the judgment of the great harlot who sits on many waters,
- 2 with whom the kings of the earth committed acts of immorality, and those who dwell on the earth were made drunk with the wine of her immorality."
- 3 And he carried me away in the Spirit into a wilderness; and I saw a woman sitting on a scarlet beast, full of blasphemous names, having seven heads and ten horns.
- 4 The woman was clothed in purple and scarlet, and adorned with gold and precious stones and pearls, having in her hand a gold cup full of abominations and of the unclean things of her immorality,
- 5 and on her forehead a name was written, a mystery, "BABYLON THE GREAT, THE MOTHER OF HARLOTS AND OF THE ABOMINATIONS OF THE EARTH."

- 12 "The ten horns which you saw are ten kings who have not yet received a kingdom, but they receive authority as kings with the beast for one hour.
- 13 "These have one purpose, and they give their power and authority to the beast.
- 14 "These will wage war against the Lamb, and the Lamb will overcome them, because He is Lord of lords and King of kings, and those who are with Him are the called and chosen and faithful."
- 15 And he said to me, "The waters which you saw where the harlot sits, are peoples and multitudes and nations and tongues.
- 16 "And the ten horns which you saw, and the beast, these will hate the harlot and will make her desolate and naked, and will eat her flesh and will burn her up with fire.

Day Four and Five


For a month now, you have been observing this chapter of Daniel. This is where it gets fun. We are going to take everything you have learned and put it on a timeline. You are going to begin to interpret Daniel 7.

On page 104 is a chart entitled "God's Plan for the Ages." There are a couple of events already on this timeline that those who hold to the infallibility of God's Word can all agree upon. Your assignment is to take the events from Daniel 2 and Daniel 7 and place them carefully on this timeline. My suggestion would be to do your work in pencil, and draw lightly so that you can easily erase if the need arises.

This assignment will take some time and some effort, but when you are done, you will have the thrill of discovering God's plan for the ages for yourself.

On the next page there is a list of events mentioned in Daniel. Using the "God's Plan for the Ages" chart, pencil in each of these events where they would fit on the timeline. Some items may talk about the same event, if they do, just add any additional details to that event. May God give you insight and understanding as you complete this assignment.

- 1. The beginning of the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem.
- 2. The four kingdoms mentioned in Daniel 2 and 7.
- 3. The fourth kingdom of Daniel 7 that devours the whole earth.
- 4. The time when the horn will utter boasts and wage war with the saints and overpower them.
- 5. The stone's crushing of the statue.
- 6. The reign of God's kingdom when all dominions serve and obey Him.
- 7. The horn speaks out against the Most High God and tries to change times and laws.
- 8. When the court sits for judgment (Dan 7:26).
- 9. The dominion of the horn is taken away, annihilated, destroyed forever (Dan 7:26).
- 10. When the kingdoms under heaven will be given to the saints of the Highest One.



More visions, more information about the future of these kingdoms. Is there any limit to the knowledge that God has of the future? Absolutely not! He knows what will be. He knew the ending before there was ever a beginning. He is a sovereign God and history is His story. Stand in awe of the mighty God we serve, and know without question, that if He knew about these kingdoms and what would happen to them, then He knows about your circumstances, and He is in control of them, too. We can rest and be secure in His sovereignty. What a mighty God we serve!

Day One and Two

- 1. We finally move on to Daniel 8. Now that we have a good grasp on Daniel 7, events in chapter 8 should sound somewhat familiar. You should begin to see the parallels as you read. You are going to do the observation worksheet for Daniel 8. You need to look for and mark in a distinctive way any key words. Make sure that you mark the ram, the goat, and the horn each in a particular way and color so that they will stand out. Don't forget to mark any synonyms and pronouns as well. Also make sure that you mark time phrases. Pray for understanding as you read through this chapter. Truth in God's Word is revealed through the Holy Spirit to those who seek understanding, so start each session in prayer.
- 2. Record any information that you glean from your key words in Daniel 8 on the lists that you have been making since the beginning of your study. Take time to review your key words and what you have learned from them. This is a wonderful opportunity to get to know your God as well as to understand what made Daniel a man of high esteem. This is what we should all be striving for in this life, to be a person of integrity that can stand for God in a respectable way that will make others take notice. When they look to us to comment on our lives, like Daniel, we can point them to the source of that life, the one and only sovereign Most High God of heaven and earth.
- 3. Read through Daniel 8 again.
 - a. How long was this after the vision he had in chapter 7?
 - b. Not what this vision was about. Be brief at this point.


4. Look at the details which Daniel has given about kingdoms that have not yet arisen. Because of the exactness of these prophesies, there are many that believe that Daniel did not truly write this book. They reason that it must have been written after all these events had transpired and someone recorded the information in all this intricate detail. They try to put God in a box understood by human reasoning. We don't serve such a small God that He can be understood by our minute minds. Glance through the first six chapters of Daniel again and jot down some of the places where it shows us that this book was written by a man named Daniel who stood in the palace of Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar and talked to these men. Yes, Daniel was there, and God revealed to him things that were going to come in the future some that have happened already, and more that are still to come. And just as the past events happened in the exact detail as laid out by Daniel through the inspiration of God, so will the things that are still to come. Yes, God is sovereign over all history and over all mankind!

5. Make sure that you have your Daniel At a Glance Chart from part 1 completed for Daniel 8, just in case you missed it when we did it together in class.

Day Three

1. There is so much detail in Daniel 8 that we need to take the time to pull it apart and see what is happening. To truly be able to do this, you are going to work on a storyboard again. Use pictures and words to show all the events that are going on in this chapter. Take your time and really think about the events that are unfolding. As you are drawing or writing out the events, label the ram, the goat, and the horn according to Daniel's interpretation of them at the end of the chapter. I've given you some space here in your book, but you can always add more of your own paper.

Daniel Lesson 12, Chapter 8 2. Did you notice where the ram was standing? Did you take note of the places that are mentioned in this chapter. We have provided a map for you. Find these places and record some of the events on the map, carefully watching the movements. There has to be some reason for God to include all these details in this account. Think through this carefully and see what you discover.




Day Four

- 1. On page 113 of this lesson, there is a chart which shows the statue of Daniel 2 and then has a column for Daniel chapter 7 and 8. Fill in the chart showing how each of these chapters fills in information about this statue. You will see that each chapter continues to amplify the other. We are given general details in chapter 2, more specific information in chapter 7, and even greater detail about two of these kingdoms in chapter 8.
- 2. Add this information to the "God's Plan for the Ages" chart located on page 104 of last week's lesson.
- 3. If you have a good commentary, you can read what it has to say about Daniel 2, 7, and 8. If it begins to talk about other chapters that we have not studied yet, STOP. Don't take away the joy of discovering this for yourself. If you choose to do this, you can record any notes below. You will have time to finish this assignment tomorrow because you are sure to find pages of materials on these three very intense chapters.

Day Five

- 1. On the bottom of this page, you will find a picture of a ram and a goat. Your job is to cut these out and add them in the appropriate place on the chart entitled "Visions of Daniel 2, 7, and 8" located in lesson 8 on page 76.
- 2. You can finish your commentary work today. Isn't it incredible what you have gleaned for yourself. There should be much about these chapters that you already know. This is why it is important that you study God's word for yourself before you look at a commentary. Commentaries are written by fallible men. They make mistakes. They are influenced by theological persuasions. How are you going to know whether they are right or wrong if you haven't taken the time to look at it yourself first? Don't run to commentaries before you have done your own thorough observations of a passage first. You are accountable as to how you handle the word of God. Be a workman that doesn't need to be ashamed who can accurately divide the word of truth (II Tim 2:15)!

Daniel Lesson 12, Chapter 8 Did you ever feel like you didn't understand the Bible? It Is confusing, and you become troubled. You begin to think, "Maybe it is just me!" You want to know and understand the Word of God. You want to understand God's mercy, His love, His justice, His salvation. Daniel was a man of high esteem, but the visions that he was seeing disturbed him. He was given glimpses of a mighty and sovereign God who was revealing the future to Daniel in vivid detail. No wonder Daniel fell on his face and pled for mercy with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes. When he humbled himself before God, God began to reveal His word to him. Oh, what we can learn from Daniel's attitude, humility, and prayer.

Day One and Two

Before you dig in to Daniel 9, read through all the steps for these two exciting days. This chapter can be a bit overwhelming, but trust me, it will make sense when we have completed the chapter study. It is one of those chapters that should cause you to fall before a sovereign and holy God and worship Him for who He is and what He has done. Be blessed and be encouraged through Daniel's humility and God's sovereignty.

- 1. You are going to find an incredible prophecy in the last four verses of this chapter, but you are going to learn a lot about this man of high esteem. Take the time to read this chapter all the way through. Allow the words to penetrate your heart.
- 2. Now read through this chapter again marking key words and time phrases. Give careful attention to the events that are mentioned and when and why they happened. Also, watch how Daniel comes to God and how God responds to him. Don't forget your lists! As you add what you learn about Daniel and God of these lists, you are building a treasure trove for yourself that will bolster you in difficult times.
- 3. At this point in time, don't get frustrated with verses 9:24-27. There will be time to intensely study these few verses.
- 4. Make sure that you have a chapter title on your "Daniel At a Glance Chart."
- 5. Don't look at your commentaries on this chapter yet. Give yourself a chance to discover the truth for yourself.

Day Three

- 1. You are going to learn a technique today that can help you whenever you encounter a difficult passage. I want to offer a warning before you get started. Many people get frustrated when they try this for the first time. The more you use this tool, the easier it is to use it, and the more you will begin to see how helpful it truly is. I offered a warning, and now I will offer an encouragement. Even if you don't do this exercise perfectly, you will learn so much for the simple reason that it will force you to think through this passage!
 - a. What you are going to do is write out a Structural Analysis of Daniel 9:24-27. As I said, when you are done, you will see much that you may have missed the first couple times through. Below are some instructions for this exercise. Read through all the instructions before you begin.
 - i. Write out the full text of the passage word for word.
 - ii. When you write it, you are going to show how words and phrases relate to each other. You do this by indenting the words under or over the word or phrase that another group of words explains, relates to, or modifies. Let me give you an example. My sentence is "When I went on vacation, I took my horse which had black socks on each foot and a white blaze down her nose, rode up the path to the lake, and swam in the cold water." This is how I would structure it (parenthesis are my explanation and not to be included in your Structural Analysis.)

When I went on vacation, (tells WHEN I took my horse, put over the phrase "took my horse") I took my horse, (main idea of the sentence called the independent clause, can stand by itself) which had black socks (tells WHAT horse - one with black socks)

on each foot (tells WHERE the socks were, put under socks)

and (shows a list - it had two things, black socks and a white blaze) a white blaze

down her nose, (tells WHERE the blaze was)

rode (this shows the second thing I did, I took and rode - a growing list)

up the path (this shows WHERE I rode I took and rode up the path)

to the lake, (tells WHERE the path leads)

and (shows a list, I took, rode, and swam) swam

in the cold water. (tells WHAT I swam in)

b. If you have access to a computer, they are very helpful in structuring. If not, hand writing has worked for many years before the invention of the computer. You may want to position your paper lengthwise to give you room to expand your thoughts. Don't get frustrated. Just do the best you can. Remember that all a Structural Analysis will do is help you to group together related thoughts and ideas.

c. Let's get you started on the Daniel 9:24-27 passage. As you do this watch your structure carefully and see if you can figure out who the pronoun "he" refers to.

"Seventy weeks have been decreed for your people and your holy city, to finish the transgression, to make an end of sin, to make atonement for iniquity,

This should get you started. Did you notice the nice list that was starting to form? Now use your own paper or computer and see what you can do. Take your time and enjoy as you begin to make sense out of this complex passage. Remember that it is God who reveals truth, so seek Him for guidance.

Day Four

- 1. For the sake of review and solidifying this in your mind, answer the following questions from the text of Daniel 9:24-27.
 - a. List everything that was to be accomplished during the seventy weeks.

b. Who is speaking in these verses and to whom are they speaking?

- c. To whom do these seventy weeks pertain? Remember who is being spoken to.
- d. With what event do these seventy weeks start?
- e. What occurs during the first sixty-nine weeks?

- f. What happens after the sixty-two weeks?
- g. Who destroys the city and the sanctuary?
- h. What city and sanctuary are destroyed?
- i. How does the end of the city and the sanctuary come?
- j. Who is the "he" that makes a "firm covenant with the many"?
- k. How long does he make the covenant for?
- I. What happens in the middle of the week?
- m. What or who comes in on the wing of abominations?
- n. What happens as a result and to whom?
- 2. Now let's take a look at this term "weeks" and see if we can make sense of what Daniel is referring to in these verses. Are these seventy literal weeks or are they something else? When we have questions like that, we need to go to the Scriptures and search out the answers. So let's begin.
 - a. Look up the word "weeks" and "sevens" in your concordance. Record the Hebrew word and it's definition and see what you learn about these words.

b. This word "weeks" is used twenty-seven times in the Old Testament. It indicates a period of seven - seven days, seven weeks, seven years. That leaves us with a problem then of interpretation. Does Daniel mean 490 days, 490 weeks, or 490 years? Let's use Daniel's writings to determine what happens in this time period.

- c. Record again what was to happen in the first sixty-nine weeks.
- d. Starting with the decree to rebuild Jerusalem and Messiah the Prince being cut off was a period of sixty-nine sevens. That means it had to happen in 483 days, weeks, or years. Since the decree to rebuild the temple came around 445 BC, and Christ was "cut off" around 30 AD, these weeks can't be referring to 483 days or 483 weeks, so they must be 483 years.
- 3. Go back and reread Daniel 9:1-3.
 - a. What had Daniel been reading and what did it say that caused Daniel to seek the Lord in the way that he did?
 - b. Read Jeremiah 25:7-14 to see what Jeremiah had written.
 - c. Do you know why the people were in captivity for seventy years?
 - d. Look up the following verses and see if you can determine the reason for this seventy year time period. Write out what you learn from each of these verses.
 - i. Leviticus 25:1-7

ii. Leviticus 26:33-35

iii. 2 Chronicles 36:17-21

e. So why did God choose to keep His people in captivity for seventy years? So who planned Israel's release at that very moment, God or Cyrus? Isn't it amazing how God orchestrated these events so perfectly. We should sit back in awe and praise Him because He alone is worthy of our praise!

Day Five

- 1. Now that you did all the leg work on this passage, let's see if we can put together some dates for these events. We know that according to Daniel 9:24 that the seventy week clock started ticking at the decree to restore and rebuild Jerusalem. Look up Nehemiah 1:1-2:9. Read through these verses and record what you find out including the king's name who issued the decree. Locate this on the chart "World Kingdoms in Daniel's Prophecies" at the end of this lesson on page 122.
- 2. On page 123, you will find a chart entitled "Daniel's Vision of the Seventy Weeks."
 - a. Using a pencil, mark in the time periods mentioned by Daniel. Starting with the Persian decree to rebuild Jerusalem mark off a space of seven sevens (or 49 years), then mark off a space of sixty-two sevens (or 434 years) to the time when the Messiah was cut off. You can use an arch or bracket to set apart these dates like this.



- b. Have all the weeks been fulfilled? Where is the seventieth week? Put that on your chart as well wherever you think that goes. Explain why you think this has or has not been fulfilled.
- 3. Daniel is told about "the people" of the prince who is to come that will destroy the city and sanctuary. Who do you think these people are? Read Luke 21:20-24 and record what you learn. If you look at the "World Kingdoms in Daniel's Prophecies" you will see that the temple and city were destroyed in 70 AD. This was done under Titus, a Roman general.
- 4. Who is "the prince who is to come"?
 - a. Who will this man be who will make a firm covenant for a week (7 years) and then break it in the middle of the week (3 1/2 years)?
 - b. This man will put a stop to sacrifice and grain offering. What does that mean?


- c. Look at these Scriptures and see what insight they can add. Record any pertinent information.

Daniel Lesson 13, Chapter 9 Do you want to be known by God as a man or woman of high esteem? What does it take to be considered that precious to God? Let's look at what we learn from Daniel, a man of high esteem.

Day One

1. Read through Daniel chapter 9. This time we are going to focus on what we learn about Daniel and his prayer. Why is Daniel praying? For who? Ask your 5 W's and H as you read through this prayer. List anything you observed below.

2. What does Daniel's prayer teach you about the way you should pray? Remember Daniel's character and integrity as you see how he poured his heart out to God.

3. Review what you have recorded on your list of key words for Daniel and God. Is there anything that you would like to add to that list at this time?

4. If you desire to read what commentaries have to say about this chapter, you can do that at this time. There is space left below to record any thoughts or questions that you may have at this time.

Day Two and Three

- 1. Observe Daniel 10. Read through it, and carefully mark key words and phrases. Make sure that you know who is being talked about through this chapter. Careful observation will help you to determine this. Make sure you mark time references. When was this message revealed to Daniel and how?
- 2. Make sure that you have a chapter title on your "Daniel at a Glance Chart."
- 3. Remember that the reason we mark key words is so we can see what they show us and teach us. Take the time to thoroughly record anything you learn about each key word, but pay close attention to what you learn about Daniel and God.

Day Four and Five

1. Hold onto your socks. This assignment is going to be a challenge. You are going to read through Daniel 9, 10, and 11 carefully. Think through this as you read. These are heavy chapters, and we will take plenty of time to study it out in the weeks to come so don't think you need to understand it all now. What you want to see is if there is a continuity between these three chapters. Explain your ideas below.

2. Now read these three chapters again. This time you are going to mark these following words and phrases in a distinctive way and make sure you catch the pronouns as well. Once you marked them all, then list what you learn about each one from the text.

a. Vision

b. Michael

c. Man dressed in linen

d. Truth

e. Your people or holy people

f. Abomination of desolation (also abominations in Daniel 9:27)

- 6. The focus in Daniel 11 and 12 is no longer on Daniel and his relationship with God, but they focus on Daniel's people. Read through your lists of key words and study what you have learned about Daniel and his relationship with God. Read through these lists slowly and carefully. Remember that I told you that if you were diligent to do this work, you would have a treasure trove of information that can help you in your life. Now is the time to put that into practice. Read through the points below and examine your life. I left you two blank pages to record your thoughts as you carefully review on each point below.
 - Examine your life and see how it compares to Daniel's.
 - Some may be walking in sin and are totally unaware of it. It could be the sin of self self-pity, preoccupation with your desires and dreams, a life centered on you and you alone.
 - Maybe you are listening to the world's philosophies they bring you to focus on your disappointments, hurts, wounds, things that were "unfair", times that you were deprived of your own personal happiness.
 - Sin comes when we center on self instead of on God, when we choose to believe the world's lies instead of God's truths and His promises.
 - Daniel suffered, too. Think about his captivity 15-16 years of age taken from family, friends, home, freedom, plans for the future, his manhood. How did he respond?
 - Let Daniel's life become a measuring rod for your own.
 - Confess your sin of self and forsake what has been keeping you from being a man or a woman of high esteem before God.
 - How can you be Daniel in your world today?

Daniel Lesson 14, Chapter 9 and 10

Daniel Lesson 14, Chapter 9 and 10 The prayer life of a true believer is an important part of his walk. If that is the case, why is it something that we struggle with so much? Why, when we go to pray, are we so easily distracted? Why do our minds wonder off? Why are we distracted by so many things? Why is it so easy to fall asleep?

Did you ever stop to think that it may be warfare? Our prayers are a conflict with Satan's schemes. He does not want us to succeed in this very important area of our lives.

Be on guard! We do not wage war with weapons of the flesh. This is a spiritual battle that can only be won on our knees, and when we put on the full armor of God. That will be our focus this week. Let's dig in!

Day One

- 1. Read through Daniel 10-12. You marked the man dressed in linen last week. If this same "person" is mentioned in Daniel 12, mark him as you read.
- 2. Was this man dressed in linen human or angelic? Give a reason from Scripture for your answer.

3. Daniel 10:12-13, 20 mentions a conflict. Where is this conflict taking place, and who is taking part in this conflict? Again, explain your answer with Scripture.

4. Gabriel and Michael are mentioned in these passages. Who are they? Let's start with Gabriel. Look up the following passages in context, and note what you learn about him.

a. Daniel 8:16

b. Daniel 9:21

c. Luke 1:19

d. Luke 1:26-27

5. Now let's take a look at what we can learn about Michael. Remember to look at the context.

- 6. We are going to take a look at some other verses to see what we can find out about angels. Read the verses carefully and note who or where they are found and what they are doing.

7. Now summarize all that you have learned about angels and heavenly conflicts. This is very important because it causes you to think through all that you have learned.

Day Two

1. Yesterday we looked at the angelic beings on the good team. Today we want to look at the other team. Where did Satan, the dragon, the serpent of old, come from? How did he get his followers the demons? Did God create Satan? Did God create evil?

We are going to read through some difficult passages. They seem to be referring to earthly kings, rulers, or princes, but they are giving us insight into Satan, his tactics, and his end.

There are many times that there are truths and prophecies that are tucked away in various parts of the Bible, dealing with various subjects. In some passages, there are immediate fulfillments to prophecy as well as future fulfillments. Let's see what we can find out about this devil that we are battling every day.

a. Look up the word for king in Ezekiel 28:12. Record the Hebrew word and what you learn about that word.

b. Ezekiel 28:11-19

- c. Look at the difference between Ezekiel 28:14 and Ezekiel 28:2, 9. Note the contrast between Ezekiel 28:1-10 and Ezekiel 28:11-19.
- d. Compare Ezekiel 28:14 with Psalms 99:1
- e. Isaiah 14:12-15 notice the use of the word star or stars

- 2. Now let's do some cross-referencing and see what we can learn about stars in these passages.
 - a. Job 38:7 the Hebrew phrase for "sons of God" is bene elohim.

b. Revelation 1:16, 20

c. Revelation 9:1

d. From what you have just read, can stars refer to angels? Explain your answer.

Day Three

 Are you having a particularly hard week getting this lesson done? Satan wants you ignorant of who he is and how he works. He doesn't want you to understand his motive or his tactics. A good soldier knows his enemy. Don't lose this battle! God has given you the power to overcome. Remember He that is in you is greater than he that is in the world. Press on! Take time to commit this time to the Lord, and ask Him to help you stand firm against your adversary. 2. We are not going to try to do a comprehensive study on Satan, but we do want to understand how he works and understand the hierarchy of his kingdom. Day Four

1. Now we know the power and structure of Satan's realm. We have seen that we are in a war with our enemy, but do you realize how much power and influence Satan and his demons have over kings, rulers, and world powers. Look at the following verses and note what you observe.

b. Judges 5:19-20

c. Daniel 8:23-24

d. Revelation 13:1-3 (Satan's power is seen all through this chapter)

- e. Revelation 16:13-14

- 2. Write our what you have learned about Satan's kingdom, the angelic conflict, and how it effects world affairs. Write it out like you were trying to explain this to another person.

Day Five

1. How's your prayer life? Do you pray for others or are your prayers more focused on you and your loved ones? Do your prayers cry out on behalf of others or are they "Bless me . . . Give me . . . Help me . . . Show me . . . ? Have you ever prayed when the very act was exhausting, it drained every ounce of strength you had? We are going to stop and look at Daniel's prayer and his search for understanding. As you read put your insights into the appropriate columns.

- 2. Read I Timothy 2:1-4. Daniel prayed for his nation, his people. Are you praying for your nation? For the world? Many people say, "I don't know how to pray for the world." Open a newspaper, a news magazine, turn on the TV, or look at the internet. Is there any lack of things to pray for? Hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, wars, famines, and all kinds of evil that mankind commits one against another. There is your world vision a world of people that are suffering and dying without God. Apply the principles that you have learned from Daniel, and lift these situations before God.
- 3. One last thing and then we will be done for the week. What have you learned that will help you pray for those who are walking in rebellion toward God and His Word? Look at the following verses with this in mind.

a. Ephesians 6:18-20

b. Acts 26:19

c. II Corinthians 4:1-4

d. Colossians 1:9-14

e. James 5:16-18

Let's purpose in our hearts to pray for one another, encourage one another, and lift one another before the Lord. We all come with different heartaches and burdens, but we can help to carry each other's burdens which will lighten our loads. Let's be a Daniel and focus on the needs of others and the world around us and not so focused on ourselves. May God richly bless you as you seek Him, and seek to live by His Word. "The Lord of hosts has sworn saying, "Surely, just as I have intended so it has happened, and just as I have planned so it will stand," Isaiah 14:24

"Thus says the Lord, the Holy One of Israel, and his Maker: Ask Me about the things to come concerning My sons, And you shall commit to Me the work of My hands. - Isaiah 45:11

The Lord has intended it so it has happened, just as He has planned so it will stand. Who is in control of this world anyway? Ask Him about the things that are to come. He wants us to understand so that we can see His mighty hand. Be prepared to stand in awe of His supremacy and power.

Day One Through Five

- 1. You are about to dig into a marvelous chapter. It is so full of prophesied history that it can be very confusing but absolutely awesome. You need to see this chapter for yourself, so we will work through steps that will give you the confidence to dig out the truths for yourself. In order to totally understand chapter eleven, you need to keep it in its context. Read Daniel chapter 10, 11, and 12. Who is the "I" mentioned in Daniel 11:1? It is very important to understand this!
- 2. Read Psalms 2. What a blessing to know that God is in control! Take a moment to praise the Lord for the truths of this chapter.
- 3. Read through the rest of the instructions completely before beginning your study. Remember that you have the rest of today and then four more days for your study. Don't rush it. Enjoy and watch God at work in history!
- 4. Read Daniel 11 and 12 and do your observation worksheets. To help you see chapter eleven a little clearer, there is a structural analysis of chapter eleven at the end of this lesson. When you are doing your observation worksheets, you may want to use this analysis located on pages 149-156 to mark your key words. Then use your regular observation worksheets for Daniel to study and mark chapter twelve. Mark geographic locations, the end, and covenant. When you mark your key words, don't forget to make your lists on what you learn about each word.
- 5. Make sure that you mark the king of the North and the king of the South in two distinct ways. You will need to read slowly and carefully to make sure of who all the "he's" and "him's" are.

- 6. Now that you marked the kings and their pronouns, you are ready to try to put names to the kings. On the next pages you will find information entitled "History of Israel's Relationship to the Kings of Daniel Eleven," and you will find a map on page 148. Carefully read through these pages, but let me point out a couple of things before you start.
 - a. Daniel was writing about visions that he did not fully understand. We will see things very differently today, looking back on these events.
 - b. History books, written by men who would never acknowledge the Lord, have become the very testimonies to the incredible accuracy of Daniel's prophesies. The things that Daniel said would happen have been recorded by these godless men.
 - c. Even men who say they believe in God say that it is impossible for Daniel to have written these words, because they deny that God could so supernaturally move in a person's life that they could record these events in such exactness and minute details. So they say that this book is a forgery. It was not written by Daniel, but by someone else telling the story of Daniel's life many years later. They don't believe in the God that I know. My God is a big God, and nothing is impossible for Him!
 - d. You want to also study the map. There are a couple of things that you need to understand about the area that we are talking about. Israel or the land of Palestine was considered to be the center of the earth. Therefore, when the author gives directions of north or south, it is determined by its relationship to Israel. The king of the North would thus be north of Israel, the king of the South would be south and when these two kings would travel from one to the other, look at whose land they would be marching through!
 - e. This book was written by Daniel. Daniel saw visions of what was going to take place in this world in the future. Allow the wonder of it all to fill your heart, and may you walk away from this lesson with a new appreciation and reverence for the God of the Universe, the great "I AM". He is the God of the past, the God of the present, and the God of the future. Go back to the introduction of this lesson and read the Isaiah verses again. As He has planned, so it will stand. What wonderful things history reveals about our amazing Heavenly Father!
- 7. With some understanding of the history of Israel with these kings, keep these pages of Israel's history before you, along with your map, and go back through the structural analysis of chapter eleven again. This time look for all your markings of the kings of the North and the kings of the South. Pencil in their names as you read through the events. Persevere, it will be worth it when you are done! This is history come to life! One of God's prophets has written beforehand His Story (history).

History of Israel's Relationships to the Kings of Daniel Eleven

Daniel 11 can be confusing, and it requires thought and some historical resources to help sort out the details. The struggle between these two nations lasted almost 150 years and it was a struggle between the South (Egypt's house of the Ptolemies) and the North (Syria's house of the Selecus)

We can't cover every detail of this ongoing struggle, but we want to cover enough material that you will grasp the sovereignty of God by giving Daniel the details of this struggle before Greece was ever a world power.

Keep in mind the following information as you study . . .

- 1. Daniel wrote these predictions in the 6th century BC (in the 500's).
- 2. All that Daniel was discussing was in the future, although we look back on it today as history. Daniel's ability to foretell the future with such accuracy could have only come through the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Daniel is presenting a Gentile world's conflicts as it relates to the nation of Israel.
- 4. Judah is located between Egypt, which is to the South, and Syria, which is to the North. Judah being in the middle of these two forces, sets them in the center of the conflict. These powers will collide in Israel's backyard, so to speak. Judah, Palestine, and Israel are all used interchangeably.
- 5. All the struggles and wars (five in all) take place with the hopes of controlling this little piece of real estate called Israel.

Study the chart on page 147, of this lesson. As you read through Daniel 11, look at this chart to determine who is who. Here are a couple of things to look for in the chart.

- 1. Notice the arrow between the third ruler of Syria (North) and the second ruler of Egypt (South). This arrow indicates a marriage between Berenice, daughter of Ptolemy II Philadelphus, and Antiochus II Theos. This marriage lasted only three years until both were killed.
- 2. Look at the arrow between Seleucus II Callinicus, fourth ruler of Syria and Ptolemy III Euergetes, third ruler of Egypt. This line represents two wars between these men. Both wars were won by the South (Egypt).

- 3. The next line is the one between the sixth ruler of the North (Syria) and the fourth ruler of Egypt. This line represents two wars. The first was won by Antiochus the Great, and the second war was won by Ptolemy IV Philopator. The second war involved the "fortress" of Raphia.
- 4. The fourth line is between Antiochus the Great and Ptolemy V Epiphanes, the four-year -old son of Ptolemy IV Philopator (South). The child had just been made king but could not fight, so the famous general, Scopas, fought for him at Paneas and then at Sidon on the Mediterranean but lost both battles to Antiochus the Great. This meant that Palestine (Israel) came under the control of Syria and remained there until the Romans came into power.
- 5. The last line on the chart is between Antiochus the Great and Ptolemy V Epiphanes of Egypt. This line represents marriage between Antiochus' daughter Cleopatra (not the famous Cleopatra) and Ptolemy V Epiphanes. This marriage was arranged in 197 BC but did not take place until 193 BC because at the time of the arrangement, the groom, Ptolemy V, was only ten years old. Antichus thought that he would gain control of Egypt through this marriage; however, his daughter did not cooperate but became a devoted wife instead.

There is a great online resource that will go through Daniel 11 and explain historically how each part was lived out in real time. Here is the link. It would be very beneficial to read if you have the chance.

Structural Analysis of Daniel Eleven

In the first year of Darius the Mede, 1 I arose to be an encouragement and a protection for him. "And 2 now I will tell you the truth Behold, three more kings are going to arise in Persia Then a fourth will gain far more riches than all of them; as soon as he becomes strong through his riches, he will arouse the whole empire against the realm of Greece. 3 "And a mighty king will arise, and he will rule with great authority and do as he pleases. But 4 as soon as he has arisen, his kingdom will be broken up and parceled out toward the four points of the compass, though not to his own descendants, nor according to his authority which he wielded, for his sovereignty will be uprooted and given to others besides them. 5 "Then the king of the South will grow strong, along with one of his princes who will gain ascendancy over him and obtain dominion; his domain will be a great dominion indeed. 6 "After some years they will form an alliance, and the daughter of the king of the South will come to the king of the North to carry out a peaceful arrangement. But

she will not retain her position of power,

nor

will he remain with his power,

but she will be given up,

along with those who brought her in

and

the one who sired her

as well as he who supported her

in those times.

7 "But one of the descendants of her line will arise

in his place,

and

he will come against their army

and

enter the fortress

of the king of the North,

he will deal with them and display great strength.

"He will stir up his strength and courage 25 against the king of the South with a large army; SO the king of the South will mobilize an extremely large and mighty army for war; but he will not stand. for schemes will be devised against him. 26 "Those who eat his choice food will destroy him, and his army will overflow, but many will fall down slain. 27 "As for both kings, their hearts will be intent on evil, and they will speak lies to each other at the same table; but it will not succeed, for the end is still to come at the appointed time.

28 "Then he will return to his land with much plunder; but his heart will be set against the holy covenant, and he will take action and then return to his own land. 29 "At the appointed time he will return and come into the South, but this last time it will not turn out the way it did before. "For 30 ships of Kittim will come against him; therefore he will be disheartened and will return and become enraged at the holy covenant and take action; so he will come back and show regard for those who forsake the holy covenant. 31 "Forces from him will arise, desecrate the sanctuary fortress, and do away with the regular sacrifice And they will set up the abomination of desolation. "By smooth words 32 he will turn to godlessness those who act wickedly toward the covenant, but the people who know their God will display strength and take action. 33 "Those who have insight among the people

will give understanding to the many;

yet they will fall by sword and by flame, by captivity and by plunder for many days. 34 "Now when they fall they will be granted a little help, and many will join with them in hypocrisy. 35 "Some of those who have insight will fall, in order to refine, purge and make them pure until the end time; because it is still to come at the appointed time. "Then the king will do as he pleases, 36 and he will exalt and magnify himself above every god and will speak monstrous things against the God of gods; and he will prosper until the indignation is finished, for that which is decreed will be done. 37 "He will show no regard for the gods of his fathers or for the desire of women, nor will he show regard for any other god; for he will magnify himself above them all. 38 "But instead he will honor a god of fortresses,

a god whom his fathers did not know; he will honor him with gold, silver. costly stones and treasures. 39 "He will take action against the strongest of fortresses with the help of a foreign god; he will give great honor to those who acknowledge him and will cause them to rule over the many, and will parcel out land for a price. 40 "At the end time the king of the South will collide with him, and the king of the North will storm against him with chariots. with horsemen and with many ships; and he will enter countries. overflow them and pass through. 41 "He will also enter the Beautiful Land, and many countries will fall; but these will be rescued out of his hand: Edom, Moab and the foremost of the sons of Ammon. 42 "Then he will stretch out his hand against other countries, and the land of Egypt will not escape. 43 "But he will gain control over the hidden treasures of gold and silver

and

over all the precious things of Egypt;

and

Libyans and Ethiopians will follow at his heels.

44 "But

rumors from the East and from the North will disturb him,

and

he will go forth with great wrath

to destroy

and

annihilate many.

45 "He will pitch the tents

of his royal pavilion between the seas and the beautiful Holy Mountain;

yet

he will come to his end, and no one will help him.

Daniel Lesson 16, Chapter 11 and 12 Matthew 24:15 says that, "When you see the ABOMINATION OF DESOLATION which was spoken of through Daniel the prophet . . ." What exactly is the "abomination of desolation"? Has anyone every asked you that question, and you have not had an answer for them? This week's study is designed to give you a thorough understanding of exactly what this event is, so that you may share with someone in the future.

It will be an interesting week as we look into the future and learn about "the time of the end." That time may be closer than we think. Have a great week of study as God's Word opens before you.

Day One and Two

This is going to be an intense week. There are a couple of topics that are linked together as we look at the end times. As we wrap up our study on the book of Daniel we want to take the time to put all the pieces together. If you are able, devote a little extra time to your study each day. If that is not possible, do what you can. This is the icing on the cake. Enjoy!

- 1. Let's start with a great review. Remember that you have two days to accomplish all these assignments. You are going to read through the following observation worksheets to put Daniel back into context with this "time of the end". As you read through these sheets, you are going to be looking for the following key words. If you haven't marked them the first time through, you are going to want to mark them now. Mark sure you mark each in a different color and/or symbol, so they will stand out from the rest of the page. The words are:
 - a. Abomination of desolation and any of its synonyms
 - b. End, time of the end, end time, end of the age, end of time, the appointed time
 - c. Indignation
- 2. Here are the passages that you will want to read and mark.
 - a. Daniel 2
 - b. Daniel 7
 - c. Daniel 8
 - d. Daniel 9:24-27
 - e. Daniel 11
 - f. Daniel 12

- 3. After you marked each of those words, write down what you learned about each of them.
 - a. Abomination of desolation
 - b. End of time references

c. Indignation

- 4. You should have noticed several references to the abomination of desolation or to the one who makes desolate, coming in on the wing of abominations, and the setting up of the abomination of desolation. What is this? From what we have studied, it seems like Antiochus Epiphanes (a Greek) can be linked with this activity, and history tells us that he desecrated the Jewish temple by offering a pig on the altar and setting up an image of Zeus to be worshipped. The question has to be asked, is this the only abomination that is being referred to in all these passages? Does Daniel refer to this happening on more than one occasion? Our goal this week will be to try to answer these questions.
- 5. Study the passage from Mark 13:3-33 that is located on pages 171-172. Use this as an observation worksheet, which means you will be reading it and marking key words. Observe it carefully! Watch for the abomination and watch and mark your time phrases. Continue to ask yourself the 5 W's and H questions as you work through this text.

6. Write down your observations and how these pertain to Daniel. Are these the same two events or two separate events?

- 7. Now you are going to do the same thing with Matthew 23:37-24:31. These are located on pages 173-174.
- 8. Summarize what you have learned from Mark and Matthew and Daniel about this event or these multiple events.

9. Now it is time to look at the phrase the time of the end, the completion of the time of God's indignation poured out on Israel. You will start by looking at Daniel passages and look at where you have marked the time phrase about the end, end time, the appointed time, time of the end, end of time, end of the age (literally days). Write down what you learn about this time.

a. Daniel 8:17

b. Daniel 8:19

c. Daniel 11:27

d. Daniel 11:35

e. Daniel 11:40

f. Daniel 12:4

g. Daniel 12:9

h. Daniel 12:13

10. What have leaned about this particular time of history by reading these passages?

11.Compare what Daniel 8:19 and Daniel 11:36 say about the "indignation." The Hebrew word is *"za'am"* and it parallels with the word *"qasap"* which means wrath. *"Za'am"* had the meaning of experiencing or expressing intense anger. Can you see how this indignation and the time of the end go together. Write out your thoughts.

12. Read through Matthew 24:3-14 once again. This time, as you read through it, mark every reference to the word "*end*". What do you learn about "*the end*" from these passages?

- 13. Here are a couple of questions to think about.
 - a. When do you think the "time of the end" happens and why do you think that?
 - b. Historically, does Antiochus Epiphanes fit into the "time of the end"? We will look at this in more depth later!

Day Three

As we begin to tie all this together, we need to revisit the kings that are talked about in Daniel 8 and Daniel 11. Are the kings that are discussed the same king, or different kings? Are they discussing kings that lived in the past or ones that will be seen in the future? That will be what we try to discover.

- 1. Read through Daniel 11:36-12:13.
 - a. List everything you learn about the king on the chart at the end of this lesson called "A Comparison of the Kings" located on page 175. Record the information in the appropriate column. Keep in mind that the Beautiful land is the land of Daniel's people, the Promised Land, the land of Israel.
 - b. What will happen at the end of this king's days (11:36-45)?
- 2. Do you think that this king is the same king that is described in Daniel 11:25-35? Read through those verses and record what you learn about the king in the appropriate column on the chart on page 175. Give a reason for your answer comparing these two Scriptures.

- 3. Let's read through some familiar Scriptures and see if we can answer a couple of questions.
 - a. Daniel 7 Read through the description of the "little horn". Where did he come from and what do we learn about him?
 - b. Revelation 12-13 What you learned about the first beast. Is this the same as the little horn in Daniel 7 or is this someone different?

- c. II Thessalonians 2:1-12 What about the "man of lawlessness" that is mentioned here? Does this sound like the "little horn" of Daniel 7?
- d. Daniel 8:9-14 Fill in the comparison chart on page 175. Now what about the "small horn" mentioned here? Where did this come from? Give a description of him. Does this sound like the same person as the "little horn," the beast, or the "man of lawlessness"?
- e. Daniel 8:23-26 Fill in the comparison chart on page 175.

- 4. Let's go back to the question at hand. Who is being talked about in Daniel 11:21-35, and who is being talked about in Daniel 11:36-45?
- 5. How do you think this relates to the missing or final week of seventy weeks of Daniel?

Scholars debate whether

- Antiochus Epiphanes fulfills all the prophecies of Daniel 8:9-26,
- Or whether Daniel 8:23-26 refers to an "antichrist" yet to come who fulfills the prophecies you studied in Mark 13 and Matthew 24.
- Others say everything Daniel prophesied was totally fulfilled by our Lord's first coming; therefore, with respect to Israel, no prophecy remains unfulfilled.

Who is right? If we pick up a commentary right now, we will not know what to believe, so let's study this out for ourselves and see what Scripture tells us. The more we read and familiarize ourselves with these Scriptures, the more prepared we are to discern truth for ourselves.

- 6. Read Daniel 8:8-26 again.
 - a. Make sure that you recorded everything on your chart "Comparisons of the Kings".
 - b. What did we study last week about the "time of the end" and the "indignation" that may shed some light on the person of Daniel 8:23-26? Do you think that Daniel 8 is explained in Daniel 10-12. Remember that in chapter 8, Daniel did not understand the vision; however in Daniel 10 one from heaven comes to explain the vision and give Daniel understanding. Is it possible that Antiochus Epiphanes was a man in that time but a foreshadowing of another man to come . . . at the "time of the end?"

7. Read Daniel 8:12-14; 11:29-35; and 12:11. Do these passages refer to the same event or different events? Explain your answer.

Day Four

- 1. Read through Daniel 12 on your observation worksheets. If you haven't done this before, mark your key words, and record what you learn about them. Don't forget to mark any time references. These have been key throughout the whole book!
 - a. What was the question asked of the man in linen who was about the waters?
 - b. What was the answer?
 - c. How long is a time, times, and half a time? Write your answer in days, months, and years.

- d. What has to be shattered?
- e. What "people" is the vision of Daniel 10-12 about? Explain your answer using Scripture.
- 2. When do you think the regular sacrifice will be abolished and the abomination of desolation set up in Daniel 12:11?
- 3. Do you think that that action has anything to do with either king in Daniel 11? Explain.
- 4. Now reason through all you have learned and see if you can conclude which "king" is represented in each of these passages:
 - a. Daniel 8:9-14
 - b. Daniel 8:23-26
 - c. Daniel 11:21-35
 - d. Daniel 11:11:36-45
- 5. Daniel 12:11 says that "from the time that the regular sacrifice is abolished and the abomination of desolation is set up, there will be 1,290 days" rather than 1,260. In the next verse he speaks about 1,355 days! What do you think these numbers beyond the 3 1/2 year period mean? Let's take a look at some of the Scriptures that speak about things that will happen at the second coming of the Lord.
 - a. Read Daniel 2:44-45 and Daniel 7:11-27. Record what will take place around the coming dominion of God upon the earth.

- b. Read Matthew 25:31-46. Answer your 5 W's and an H questions about this passage and record your insights. Who are those who endure? Do you think any of this could account for the additional days between 1,260 and 1,290?
- c. Some believe 1,335 days include the time to set up the millennial reign. Read the following verses and record what happens after the Lord returns to set up His kingdom:
 - i. Revelation 20:4

ii. I Corinthians 6:2-3

iii. Matthew 25:14-30

iv. Revelation 2:26-29

v. Luke 19:11-27

Day Five

1. The book of Daniel closes with an assurance that Daniel will rise for his allotted portion at the end of the age. Look up the following passages and note what they teach about the rewards that are to be given at that time.

a. Matthew 16:27

b. Luke 6:23

- c. 2 John 8
- d. Revelation 11:18
- e. Revelation 22:12
- 2. Do you realize that you are going to stand before a perfect God one day and give an account for all the deeds you have done, good or bad, and be rewarded accordingly? Read and record what these verses tell us.
 - a. 2 Corinthians 5:10
 - b. Romans 14:10

If you are a true believer in the Lord Jesus Christ, you will stand at His judgment seat to give an account. What will He say to you? What should you be doing right now? What should you change in your life? What should you keep doing? What must you do to be prepared for that day?

3. Read Daniel 11:32-33. These verses are in the context of when Antiochus Epiphanes tries to turn the people to godlessness. How do those days parallel with the days we live in now? What will the days ahead be like - better or worse? How will you stand? What should you be doing? Are you ready to be a Daniel in the world today and in the future?

4. Read Daniel 12:3. It seems like the church of America today has turned inward - thinking only of ourselves. We have forgotten the command to deny ourselves, take up our crosses, and follow the One who came to minister to us. Many are leaving behind the Word of God and preaching another gospel - one of worldliness and selfishness. What can we learn from this verse?

5. If you would like, you can read what your commentaries have to say about Daniel 11-12. It will be interesting to see what they have to say after what you have studied. Jot down any relevant notes you may have on these passages.

3 As He was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter and James and John and Andrew were questioning Him privately,

4 "Tell us, when will these things be, and what will be the sign when all these things are going to be fulfilled?"

5 And Jesus began to say to them, "See to it that no one misleads you.

6 "Many will come in My name, saying, 'I am He!' and will mislead many.

7 "When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be frightened; those things must take place; but that is not yet the end.

8 "For nation will rise up against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will also be famines. These things are merely the beginning of birth pangs.

9 "But be on your guard; for they will deliver you to the courts, and you will be flogged in the synagogues, and you will stand before governors and kings for My sake, as a testimony to them.

10 "The gospel must first be preached to all the nations.

11 "When they arrest you and hand you over, do not worry beforehand about what you are to say, but say whatever is given you in that hour; for it is not you who speak, but it is the Holy Spirit.

12 "Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child; and children will rise up against parents and have them put to death.

13 "You will be hated by all because of My name, but the one who endures to the end, he will be saved.

14 "But when you see the ABOMINATION OF DESOLATION standing where it should not be (let the reader understand), then those who are in Judea must flee to the mountains.

15 "The one who is on the housetop must not go down, or go in to get anything out of his house;

16 and the one who is in the field must not turn back to get his coat.

17 "But woe to those who are pregnant and to those who are nursing babies in those Days

18 "But pray that it may not happen in the winter.

19 "For those days will be a time of tribulation such as has not occurred since the beginning of the creation which God created until now, and never will.

20 "Unless the Lord had shortened those days, no life would have been saved; but for the sake of the elect, whom He chose, He shortened the days.

21 "And then if anyone says to you, 'Behold, here is the Christ'; or, 'Behold, He is there'; do not believe him;

22 for false Christs and false prophets will arise, and will show signs and wonders, in order to lead astray, if possible, the elect.

23 "But take heed; behold, I have told you everything in advance.

24 "But in those days, after that tribulation, THE SUN WILL BE DARKENED AND THE MOON WILL NOT GIVE ITS LIGHT,

25 AND THE STARS WILL BE FALLING from heaven, and the powers that are in the heavens will be shaken.

26 "Then they will see THE SON OF MAN COMING IN CLOUDS with great power and glory.

27 "And then He will send forth the angels, and will gather together His elect from the four winds, from the farthest end of the earth to the farthest end of heaven.

28 "Now learn the parable from the fig tree: when its branch has already become tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near.

29 "Even so, you too, when you see these things happening, recognize that He is near, right at the door.

30 "Truly I say to you, this generation will not pass away until all these things take place.

31 "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will not pass away.

32 "But of that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but the Father alone.

33 "Take heed, keep on the alert; for you do not know when the appointed time will come.

Matthew 23:37-24:31

37 "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, who kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to her! How often I wanted to gather your children together, the way a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, and you were unwilling.

38 "Behold, your house is being left to you desolate!

39 "For I say to you, from now on you will not see Me until you say, 'BLESSED IS HE WHO COMES IN THE NAME OF THE LORD!"

24:1 Jesus came out from the temple and was going away when His disciples came up to point out the temple buildings to Him.

2 And He said to them, "Do you not see all these things? Truly I say to you, not one stone here will be left upon another, which will not be torn down."

3 As He was sitting on the Mount of Olives, the disciples came to Him privately, saying, "Tell us, when will these things happen, and what will be the sign of Your coming, and of the end of the age?"

4 And Jesus answered and said to them, "See to it that no one misleads you.

5 "For many will come in My name, saying, 'I am the Christ,' and will mislead many.

6 "You will be hearing of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not frightened, for those things must take place, but that is not yet the end.

7 "For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and in various places there will be famines and earthquakes.

8 "But all these things are merely the beginning of birth pangs.

9 "Then they will deliver you to tribulation, and will kill you, and you will be hated by all nations because of My name.

10 "At that time many will fall away and will betray one another and hate one another.

11 "Many false prophets will arise and will mislead many.

12 "Because lawlessness is increased, most people's love will grow cold.

13 "But the one who endures to the end, he will be saved.

14 "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in the whole world as a testimony to all the nations, and then the end will come.

15 "Therefore when you see the ABOMINATION OF DESOLATION which was spoken of through Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place (let the reader understand),

16 then those who are in Judea must flee to the mountains.

17 "Whoever is on the housetop must not go down to get the things out that are in his house.

18 "Whoever is in the field must not turn back to get his cloak.

19 "But woe to those who are pregnant and to those who are nursing babies in those days!

20 "But pray that your flight will not be in the winter, or on a Sabbath.

21 "For then there will be a great tribulation, such as has not occurred since the beginning of the world until now, nor ever will.

22 "Unless those days had been cut short, no life would have been saved; but for the sake of the elect those days will be cut short.

23 "Then if anyone says to you, 'Behold, here is the Christ,' or 'There He is,' do not believe him.

24 "For false Christs and false prophets will arise and will show great signs and wonders, so as to mislead, if possible, even the elect.

25 "Behold, I have told you in advance.

26 "So if they say to you, 'Behold, He is in the wilderness,' do not go out, or, 'Behold, He is in the inner rooms,' do not believe them.

27 "For just as the lightning comes from the east and flashes even to the west, so will the coming of the Son of Man be.

28 "Wherever the corpse is, there the vultures will gather.

29 "But immediately after the tribulation of those days THE SUN WILL BE DARKENED, AND THE MOON WILL NOT GIVE ITS LIGHT, AND THE STARS WILL FALL from the sky, and the powers of the heavens will be shaken.

30 "And then the sign of the Son of Man will appear in the sky, and then all the tribes of the earth will mourn, and they will see the SON OF MAN COMING ON THE CLOUDS OF THE SKY with power and great glory.

31 "And He will send forth His angels with A GREAT TRUMPET and THEY WILL GATHER TOGETHER His elect from the four winds, from one end of the sky to the other.
