What in the world is that strange man doing? God's prophets were God's spokesmen on earth given as His mouthpiece. They were to speak to the people and warn them, wake them up as they called out, "Thus says the Lord!"

They were called to speak, but they were also called to act. They were a visual example painting a picture to those who passed by. You can imagine the rumor mill that commenced. "I went to the market today and you will never guess what Ezekiel was doing." "I saw him doing that same thing last week." "What do you think it means?" "Mommy, that strange man is still there. Why?"

Can you answer that question? Do you know what he is doing and why? Let's see if we can figure it out!

DAY 1

- 1. Observe Ezekiel 4. *Nations* is going to become a key word in Ezekiel. You want to carefully watch what happens in the nations. You will begin to observe events that indicate the soon coming of the Messiah. The first time He came in reference to sin, the next time He comes it will be to judge the world (Hebrews 9:28). Let's add some key words to your marking card. Look for all of these words as you read each chapter of Ezekiel. This time you are on your own to determine how you are going to mark each word. 4. Read through this chapter one more time and record what you believe is going on. You will spend one more day looking at this chapter, so don't be concerned if you still have some questions. Just record the questions you may have.

DAY 3

Today you are going to look at Ezekiel 4 and 5 together. How do they relate to one another? Are they talking about the same thing or different things? What are these pictures or actions communicating to the people who witness them? Answering those questions will be your assignment for today. Are you ready? As you search for truth, remember to start your time in prayer seeking wisdom and understanding from the One who orchestrated all of this. Ask God to show you His ways and His heart for His people.

1. Read Ezekiel 4 and 5. When you are finished, record what pictures are given in each chapter.

2. Think about the time when this occurred. Where are they? Why are they there? What has happened to them? Who are these pictures for? Why did he use these illustrations?

3. Do you think Ezekiel actually did these things? Should we read this literally? Explain your reasoning.

4. How do chapter four and five relate to each other? Do you see a correlation?

- 5. Read Ezekiel 5 again. What does Ezekiel's cutting of his hair and beard picture?
- 6. What did you learn from marking the following words?

b. sanctuary

c. abomination

- 7. Let's take a close look at the word *abomination*.
 - a. How often do you hear this word used in conversations in our modern world.
 - b. Look up the Hebrew definition of this word.
 - c. Look up the following verses and record what God considers to be an abomination. Put a big star next to any of these things that are occurring in our world today.

1) Leviticus 18:22-30

2) Deuteronomy 7:25; 12:31

3) Deuteronomy 25:13-16

8. Taking into consideration all that you learned about what an abomination means and what God considers to be an abomination, how does this impact the way you view our world today? Think about Ezekiel living in our world today, with our social media abilities. Could you imagine the coverage he would get? Ezekiel gone viral!

DAY 4

- 1. Today, you will move on to Ezekiel 6. Here are the new words to add to your bookmark.

- 3. What did you learn by marking the references to the mountains? These are important!
- 4. You marked "*will know that I am the Lord*." What does God want them to know? There are pages at the end of this lesson where you can keep a running account of what God wants them to know. Record this information from this time forward (include chapter and verse). You can take this page out so you can use it from week to week, just like the map, timeline, and At a Glance Chart.
